Our Return to Play guidance provided a clear pathway for the sport to get back on the field and the huge collective effort from clubs, players, coaches, officials, organisers and volunteers to follow the guidance in a safe and responsible manner. The Board, committees and EL staff have continued to work together under Hannah's guidance as we have continued to recruit experienced and knowledgeable directors to join the Board and I am excited for the future progression of the organisation.

These groups comprised largely of volunteers, give their time and effort to improving the sport and shaping the future direction of lacrosse without which we would not be in the position we are.

LACROSSE FOR ALL

RETURN TO PLAY (RTP) has enabled the sport to fully restart, and regular lacrosse participation is showing signs of stabilising, with an increase in regular participation since November 2021. We have helped the community game get back on its feet with support for membership, changes to the learning platform and targeted support in operations highlighted below outline our commitment to providing more opportunities to participate in lacrosse.

Changes to our membership structure and categories as a direct response to feedback from the Regional Associations and key volunteer committees have been positively received by the lacrosse community with over 800 taking up new membership categories. This includes our 50% membership discount for the latter half of the season, addressing the changing nature of lacrosse in England and a requirement for a fairer offer for those who may play outside the traditional lacrosse season and our commitment to improving the accessibility of the sport. We also introduced a COVID recovery fund for clubs and universities to access for financial support. To date, at least 25 universities and clubs have successfully accessed support (financial or in form of kit/equipment) enabling retention of lacrosse activity in areas that were vulnerable to cessation especially through facility pressure.

This help has seen a 9% increase in Affiliated Clubs since April 2021 alongside our community game showing a rebound through increasing club participation by 16% over the same period.

As part of our commitment to improving inclusion and accessibility in lacrosse, we have helped a number of areas detailed throughout this report to begin to provide a more flexible offering across the sport, from universities and Further Education to new playing offers.

UNIVERSITY LACROSSE

The revitalisation of Higher Education Institution (HEI) activity, as well as the new programme interventions, are key to maintaining growth and addressing residual issues from COVID across participation segments. The HEI programme, although having contracted over COVID, restarted with 85 men's and 136 women's teams in BUCS

alongside 34 ULOs across the university network. Congratulations should go to the University of Nottingham (women) and University of Durham (men) as 2022 BUCS Champions.

We continue to monitor the effect of engaging with sport at university through a bi- annual

social-outcomes and student well-being survey. This provides us with vital knowledge about student participation in lacrosse. Our recent surveying shows how the university sector brings new people (69% of the 11,500 HEI participants never having played before) and from more diverse backgrounds (11% of participants are from

verse backgrounds and 9% from the 30% of the most deprived areas) into lacrosse.

LACS FE PROGRAMME

The Lacrosse Accredited College Scheme (LACS) in partnership with AoC Sport has continued to boom with 31 FE institutions in the programme for 2021/22, representing over 4500 students accessing lacrosse.

With the support of AoC Sport, 4 lacrosse 'festivals' are planned for summer 2022 in key areas identified as strategically significant for participation growth: North-East, Greater Manchester, Midlands, and South Coast.

Ongoing support from The Lacrosse Foundation with equipment grants alongside our team overseeing teacher and young leader training is proving positive for participation expansion in this market.



The FE sector is also seen to underpin the successful HEI programme and provides a platform for expansion of the talent pool. We will work to create methods to track the FE participants as they progress through the lacrosse pathway.

As the FE and HE programmes strengthen post-pandemic, we are now focusing on the participation and competition exit routes beyond the education sector and moving into the

community sector.

BACKING THE BEST

RTP has enabled us to restart the 'Backing the Best' programme, focusing on low socio economic group participation in the North West, feeding into the talent pathway as part of the Playground to Podium pathway.

The programme has provided equipment and trained 20 staff in Salford who are now delivering in community hubs throughout the area.

15 community leisure coaches had also been trained in Rochdale, however the staff were unfortunately made redundant due to COVID. New staff are now set to be trained in May 2022.

SUMMER LAX & MIXED LACROSSE

Establishing more options to play is key for EL to harness the positive participation initiatives highlighted above and strengthen the existing community lacrosse offer. The "Summer Hub" programme is seen as an initiative which can be delivered easily, with EL providing the governance and over arching coordination, but with local

leads. After the successful roll out of Summer Lax Hubs in 2021, the offer is being refined for 2022 to ensure quality of delivery and maximisation of participant retention.

2021-22 also saw the roll out of a National Mixed League, with 16 teams divided

into 2 regions, with 2 groups per region. The competition saw round robin league fixtures and inter-group fixtures, followed by regional play offs. The National Final, held at the National Club Championships was played between Oxford City (South East Regional Champs) and Cambridge University (Midlands Regional champs) at the National Club Finals on 8th May, won 12-6 by Cambridge University Mixed Lacrosse Club. The combination of Summer Hubs, Mixed Leagues and FE festivals provides more options for more people to play lacrosse in more places, creating more opportunities for community lacrosse.

GREATER MANCHESTER STIMULUS

Schools have been particularly hard hit during the pandemic, with many significantly reducing their PE provision alongside suffering the impact of lock down protocols. This has had a knockon effect to links with after-school sport and community club sport. As part of the post-COVID stimulus to community lacrosse, we have worked with the North West region to reinvigorate school lacrosse in Greater Manchester through deployment of a Greater Manchester Officer. The officer has co-ordinated and developed links between the school games offer and lacrosse clubs, focusing on developing links where they didn't exist while also enhancing existing links. They worked with club volunteers to identify the health of their programme and identify areas to implement our support, worked with 8 boroughs to run POP competitions partnering with local clubs, administered and managed the GM Pop finals, and worked with clubs and School Games Officers to deliver 5 clubs school festivals.

Data from Youth Sport Trust has shown the impact of the stimulus with 180% increase in teams participating in lacrosse school games, tournament and festivals. The initiative is set to continue into 2022-23 where the impact of the work will be built on.

TALENT & PERFORMANCE

The Talent and Performance programme continues to work to empower individuals to become elite athletes as development of the Talent Pathway system strives to meet the increasing expectations of the organisation.

As the sport of lacrosse restarted, over 1000 athletes (18 and under) have been part of our Talent system this year across our Girls and Boys pathways. The addition of the County Talent Camps at U13 level has strengthened the talent identification process and given a clearer and more robust entry point into the system.

To support the programme, we have also begun to improve the experience for our young athletes with increased digital resources, development webinars with top athletes and sports professionals, and for next season we will be implementing expert-led mental health resilience workshops into all our programmes.

The addition of sixes to future international calendars will also provide new and exciting opportunities with a format that is being put forward for Olympic and Commonwealth inclusion. The Fly provided the first formal 6s competition in the world, and enabled our elite athletes to play high-level competition at a time when no international matches were possible and will be in all our squads' training programmes moving forward.

Alongside the Fly, we sent a U23 squad to EuroLax Sixes in Portugal in February, and with many England squad members training with British Lacrosse ahead of The World Games, we are now looking at how Sixes is fully incorporated into our performance programmes.

Global travel restrictions over the last 12 months has limited high-level competition for our national squads in the lead up to major championships in 2022. However, each squad has shown great resilience in adapting their training programmes to address this and are well set ahead of the events coming up this summer.

Our Women's Senior squad were able to travel to Florida in January for training and limited competition which has allowed us to establish clear COVID protocols for overseas competition and will set up our international squads for travel this summer. There are three England squads set to compete in major Championships in the 2022 summer after another blank year due to the pandemic, we wish them all the success they deserve.

PEOPLE IN LACROSSE

We have continued to actively support the volunteer workforce via all avenues available and at all levels of the our structure to keep them engaged during the low activity periods and then adequately prepared for the return of the game.

This was highlighted in the restart to the game where we engaged with new and welcomed back existing volunteers to work alongside our team in delivering our flagship National Schools Championships successfully in its return to Aldershot.

The level of volunteer support for the event demonstrated the hard work carried out in engaging with and supporting our volunteer workforce during the pandemic.

People who volunteer in lacrosse help players to participate more often, with over 1000 registered officials and 500 registered coaches, community lacrosse has the platform to continually develop.

However, it is evident that volunteers face fresh challenges with the increased cost of living. We have had an open dialogue with regional chairs and committees to monitor and support them in what will be continue to be a challenge in recruitment and retention of volunteers moving forwards into 2023.

We are still seeing the impact of COVID on our active workforce with a backlog of assessments to undertake, although this has stabilised as the season has progressed.

To support all workforce training we provided improved flexibility for accessing courses and assessment by offering blended hybrid learning to the first two levels of all workforce learning to help stimulate activities and reduce learner costs.

In addition, both new and continuing learners now have access to a wider range of resourcing through investment in our online platforms.

Even with the issues emerging from COVID, over 800 young leaders, teachers, coaches and officials have accessed learning through EL courses.

Having had the event programme curtailed via the pandemic for over the last year, it was great to finally be able to complete a year of competitive events at Regional and National level within the 2021-22 season. England Lacrosse would like to thank all the volunteers, coaches, officials, players, family and friends who all enabled this to happen.

Being able to host the National Schools Championship again, having had a break for over a year was a highlight to the season. In all its history the Championship has never had to have a fallow year, which meant that the return needed to highlight a celebration of lacrosse for players, coaches, volunteers, officials, and spectators. With the weather on our side, we were able to create that feeling of togetherness.

The four days of the championship showed off some fantastic schoolgirl lacrosse and provided a true feeling of excitement being back on the competitive stage. The event was topped off with Putney High being crowned as champions in the U19A age category. This was the first time in National Schools history that Putney had taken the win. We look forward to the 2023 Championships, which will be hosted at Aldershot March 11th – 14th.

National Club finals was back and saw the addition of the mixed finals added to the schedule. The competition was hosted for the first time at Moulton College, Northampton and it didn't disappoint.

Both the Men's and Women's teams were fighting it out to be crowned National Club Champions and gain a place in the European Club finals. Having been unable to host the competition due to the pandemic, it was great to see the skill and enthusiasm of all the club teams come together and develop an exciting competition. Hosting the mixed final in the schedule just added to this excitement and unity

Walcountian Blues Women and Spencer Men were both too the title of National Championships and booked their place at the European Club Championships in Barcelona.

Full lacrosse leagues and competitions were also able to take place at regional levels with both the Southern and Northern knock-out "Flags Final" weekends delivering a true festival of lacrosse, which hadn't been possible in previous years due to COVID restrictions. The Northern Flags saw for the first time a fully combined tournament, with the women's U14 and Open age knock-out finals alongside the men's competition.







The Fly, utilising the new Olympic-proposed format, is a pioneering competition for both EL and the wider international game as the first elite level competition using the Sixes rules of the sport.

With no international events for 2021, the opportunity was taken to support our world class, high-performance athletes in expressing themselves on the biggest stage.

And with lacrosse on the path to Olympic inclusion, we've recognised the need to support high-performance, international athletes on their journey to the Olympics.

The 6s format will see its first introduction to the international arena at the 2022 World Games and our event will make sure our top athletes are ready to compete with the world's best.

The Fly featured side-by-side men's and women's competitions, giving our male and female athletes absolute equality in profile and performance, and was hosted at Lilleshall National Sports Centre, an elite internationally recognised venue for world class sport.

This work with the venue has also provided opportunity for other areas of the organisation such as Talent & Performance squads to fully

utilise the facilities on offer throughout the year. With uncertainty around COVID for spectator events, the focus for The Fly in its first year was centred around athlete provision and performance.

We have also invested significantly in the digital output of The Fly, creating a product that is much more than in-person event and promotes the sport in a new, modern way with the aim to reaching audiences who engage with sport in different ways.

After a successful first year in which we had positive feedback from athletes, we will continue to expand the offering within the event, as well as for our audiences both at the event and across our digital offering.

The Fly was a significant undertaking for the Events department and the wider organisation, and to take the event from an initial idea to its inception in just over a year has been a monumental achievement.

With the momentum behind The Fly and the bid for Olympic inclusion, we see the Fly as being the ideal vehicle to progress the growth and stature of the sport as a national league attracting external investment and attention from new and engaged audiences.

FINANCE

The main focus of this year's financial activities was supporting our COVID recovery plan. The recovery plan has been regularly reviewed to secure the business during the year, secure the return of as many of our priorities as possible and to support our members and partners in recovering from the impact of the pandemic.

EL recieved a 5th "additional" Sport England grant for 2021-22 funding totalling £673,875. The grant investment has sustained the organisation, improved our governance, ensured that support was provided to the recovery of the sport post pandemic and improved Lacrosse's inclusion priorities enabling more individuals to be a part of the game.

As part of the recovery plan tight fiscal control over income and expenditure has taken place which has enabled us to successfully meet the financial targets set in the annual budget as demonstrated by the figures on page 25.

game including a freeze of membership and affiliation fees at 2019-20 levels, a 50% reduction in the cost of all education courses, a regional administered COVID fund to support clubs with costs of sustaining facilities, retaining membership, and providing support for lacrosse returning during the year. This package has assisted in the quick and strong return of the sport as highlighted in this annual report.


During the year we held the first formal Sixes event with support from World Lacrosse. "The Fly" marked a significant step for the business by piloting a new asset for development.

England Lacrosse is pleased to have secured £2,962,000 Sport England Sector Partner Funding for the 1st April 2022 to 31st March 2027. The award is based on an agreed set of objectives to support our systems and governance, delivery, and talent programme. This support from Sport England for Lacrosse and the good financial management during the year provides us with a strong financial base for the future.



We have continued to go beyond the Code for Sports Governance guidelines by maintaining at least 40% female and 70% independent representation on the EL Board, allowing the Board to maintain a broad view on the strategic direction of the organisation.

We have also welcomed Tim Hunt and Jill Giddins to the Board as new Independent Directors and are looking forward to their skills and expertise adding value to our organisation.

Cascading governance and good practices throughout the lacrosse community is a key focus for modernising EL governance. The coming months allow space for continued momentum, that has been gained via the monthly regional chairs calls and the increased regional officer engagement with regions following the submission of development plans for the 2022-23 season.

Since October, we have also addressed areas requiring progress identified in the annual review with the CPSU. The key areas have focused on the cascading of safeguarding monitoring, which has now been included as part of a full-time administrative role, to improve our administration and better align training to individual requirements.

Website content and signposting has been improved and EL has launched a bespoke 1-to-1 mentoring system for Regional, Club and Talent welfare officers. This system is in its early stages, but the feedback has been positive with individuals feeling better prepared for their roles, with a full evaluation to be undertaken at the end of 2022.

We have also published a new Adults at Risk policy and procedure to complement our safeguarding policies. This has been developed with the Ann Craft Trust and provides up to date information and procedures for all in Lacrosse working with adults.

We are delighted to have worked with UKAD to comply with the Anti-Doping Assurance framework, aligning with our values in promoting and advocating clean sport.

All of the Board committees and supporting groups have continued to undertake their duties to support the Board and the development of EL with the National Lacrosse Committee (NLC), Finance Audit and Risk Committee (FARC), Remunerations Committee (RemCom) and Performance Committee all assisting with smooth running of the organisation.



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
